

MEMORIES AND CONTRASTS

MOST of the spectators at this year's Varsity Match will be I presume, Old Blues, schoolboys and followers of Association Football. What therefore, does this match mean to me, one of this group—an old Dark Blue who played his three Varsity Matches in the mid-thirties, when Association Football was somewhat different from what it is today?

Undoubtedly to me, it means "memories" of friends, colleagues and opponents who made my own appearances at Highbury, where we played the game in those days, unforgettable. It also means "contrasts" for our style and approach to the game were by no means as professional as they are today.

Coming up to Oxford from Queen Elizabeth's Grammar School, Blackburn, where I had been nurtured in tough, Northern Schools football (I can never forget our Annual games with Manchester Grammar School—what a thrill it was to beat them!), I was immediately whisked into a new world of Soccer.

At Oxford, we had almost a weekly game with the pro sides—Tottenham, Aston Villa, Birmingham, Arsenal—who at that time had two youngsters called Compton playing for them! Consequently we had to be, above all fit. Our coach was the old Spurs Captain, Arthur Grimsdell, and what a good teacher he was too! Under his guidance I learned a great deal about the arts and skills of soccer, which later became extremely helpful to me when I played for Blackburn Rovers (still as an Amateur).

For one thing, above all, I'll always be grateful to Arthur; he advised me "to stop smoking and keep physically fit, if you want to enjoy the game". I took this advice, have never regretted it, and today in my middle fifties, I keep fit and well and enjoy tennis all the year round.

Besides Arthur Grimsdell, other personalities from the mid-thirties—whom I can never forget are such eminent people as Sir Harold Thompson—"Tommy" to all of us—his friends. Then, he was our Treasurer, and the man who moulded the Oxford side (later he did the same for Pegasus). Today he is Vice-Chairman of the F.A.—and still a keen follower of the game. Sandy Duncan—who this year has once again been in charge of our Olympic Team in Mexico—in my Oxford days, Sandy was a fleet-footed full back. John Hill was our goalie—now he plays the political game in Westminster. Jimmy Burrows, a Jamaican, was one of our tough half backs—now he cures people of their ailments in a very profitable medical business in Kingston, Jamaica.

When I played centre-forward for Oxford, my regular Cambridge opponent was another tough northerner—Dan Pettit—with whom I became—off the field—good friends. Indeed he was best man at my wedding! We played many games together for Northern Nomads and the Corinthians. Those were good days—and good teams too! Men like "Taj" Webster, Tommy Whewell, Howard Fabian, Bertie Woolcock, Tony Strasser, Freddy Riley, John Sutcliffe, Bernard Joy, Maurice Edelston, Oliver Hunt—they were my friends and playing colleagues.

To many people present today—these can only be names. But to me, they are more than names, for not only were they my friends—but they were also keen amateur footballers, who played a hard and good game, both on and off the field. Win or lose, it didn't matter a damn, provided we had a good game—played football, healthy and robust yes—but dirty—no.

Yes, I still think my memories are pleasant ones—and perhaps, in this respect, the thirties were happier and cleaner Soccer days than they are today. Isn't there a lesson in this for someone?

- A. SOULSBY (Durham Johnston G.S. and Pembroke), Right Half In his second year reading engineering. After some good performances for the Centaurs he earned himself a place in the University 1st team towards the end of last season, which he has kept ever since.
